President's Message

elcome to the 2018 spring edition of the Copake Lake Conservation Society newsletter. The Board of Trustees (BOT) has been very busy over the last several months reviewing lake treatment options and shoreline erosion issues, studying the dam for water flow, and gathering data on invasive species, to name a few topics that will benefit our lake property owners today and for generations to come. Combining strategic planning for sustainable solutions is always a challenge. Factor in a growing lake population, extended seasonal use of the lake waters, and Mother Nature's deviations from what we have known as the "norm", and these factors intensify the outcome. Many have seen the growth and restoration around our lake. This brings increased activities on our waters. In years past, by the Labor Day holiday, the utilization of the lake would diminish with the exception of our avid fishermen. Over the most recent decade, you will find boats, water skiers, tubers, and PWCs sharing the lake with those same avid fishermen well into October. The Copake Lake Conservation Society has been weighing possible options to assist in using the lake later into the fall season and throughout the winter as the lake freezes. Mother Nature's variations from high to low degrees of temperature, from rain bursts to dry spells, from heavy winds to still air, and from thick ice to no ice, are affecting our lake waters, shoreline, and watershed each in their own unique way. Finding a balance matters!

After extensive analysis of our lake environment and careful deliberation, the CLCS BOT voted on a treatment plan for the future of our beloved lake. This plan is initially costly, budgeted for \$179K, but spread out over a three-year time period it is not totally out of range with our existing individual yearly treatment expenses. Year after year the cost of goods and services continues to rise. Since 1979, the Copake Lake Conservation Society has asked for annual membership dues of \$100. The BOT, over the years, has brought up the need to increase the dues. However, rather than increase dues the BOT has consistently come up with innovative fundraising opportunities to help offset increasing costs, for example, ads in our newsletter, the Summer BASH, the Labor Day Weekend raffle, and the sale of merchandise. I cannot urge people enough to become members. Please get involved in contributing to help maintain our waters. Your contributions will help maintain our savings reserves, preparing for rainy days. The Copake Lake Conservation Society is very grateful for all our lake members. Thank you to the Lake Angels, Lake Fanatics, Lake Lovers, Lake Members, and Lake Friends for your years of generous support. It is immeasurable. Your contributions are the pillars that support Copake Lake. Remember lake value equates to property value! Membership matters!

We all want safe navigable waters which is part of our mission statement. However, we need everyone's help in achieving this goal. What better way than to start the season off with our annual CLCS Shoreline Clean Up Day on Saturday, May 26, from 9 a.m.-12 noon (rain date Sunday, May 27, from 9 a.m.-12 noon. Please mark your calendars and lend a hand to free our waters from debris. Clean up matters!

Whether you are concerned about membership and dues, or safety on the lake, or preserving Copake Lake for future generations, your point of view is very important to us! Please come and let your voices be heard at our annual meeting held at the Copake Town Hall on Saturday, July 7, from 10 a.m.-12 noon. Your voice matters!

Take a look inside the newsletter at our CLCS calendar for several other up and coming events. I am looking forward to the seasons ahead with an abundance of warm sunshine, sparkling waters, hours of laughter, and crossing paths with many of you in the months ahead. Lake Life Does Matter!

July 4th is on a Wednesday this year. Join us on land or by sea. Fill your July 4th with lasting memories.





You can bring your broken lawn chairs, old lamps, TVs, batteries, tires (maximum of 4, none larger than 19" rims), and pretty much everything other than household garbage and hazardous waste such as paint. Copake Lake Shoreline Clean-Up Day is scheduled for May 26, 2018 (Saturday of Memorial Day Weekend), with rain date of Sunday, May 27, 2018) from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon. 

Approved NYS Boat Safety Certification Requirements

ccording to New York State Boating Laws and Regulations, you must hold an approved NYS boat safety certificate if:

- You were born on or after 5/I/96. You must successfully complete an approved NYS boating course in order to operate any type of motorized vessel.
- You operate a personal watercraft and are at least 14 years of age.
- You wish to operate a motorboat (other than a personal watercraft) and you are at least 10 years old and less than 18 years old.
- If you are less than 10 years old you may operate a motor-boat (non-PWC) only if someone over 18 is on board with you. Anyone may operate a personal watercraft if someone over 18 is on board with you and they hold a NYS approved boat safety certificate.

Courses offered online or live in classrooms:

There are many opportunities to take the NY State Boat Safety Course. Courses may be taken in classrooms or online. Classes are posted regularly on the following website:



2018 Copake Lake Boating Rules And Regulations

Source, New York State Office of Parks Recreation & Historical Preservation (www.nysparks.com/recreation/boating)

AGE: Motorized boat operators must be 18 or over. Or, between the ages of 10 and 18 must have completed certified boating safety (NYS Law).

AGE: As of May 1, 2014, operators born after May 1, 1996 must have a NYS approved Safe Boating Course and be at least 10 years of age in order to operate a motorboat in New York State.

BOATING HOURS: Watercraft must not exceed 6 mph between 8 p.m. and 9 a.m. (Town Ordinance).

NOISE: All watercraft must have effective mufflers (Town Ordinance). Watercraft noise must not exceed 75 decibels (NYS Law).

SPEED: All watercraft must slow down to 5 mph when less than 100 ft from shore, dock, or other vessel, or in "no wake" zones (NYS Law).

RIGHT OF WAY: Motorized watercraft must yield to swimmers and non-motorized watercraft (NYS Law).

SAFETY:

- a. Personal Flotation Devices (PFD): Children under the age of 12 must wear approved PFD while in a watercraft. Approved flotation devices are required for each person on board (NYS Law).
- b. Water Skiing: Water skiers must have a "look-out" over the age of 10 (NYS Law).
- c. BWI: Boating while impaired or intoxicated subject to fines or imprisonment (NYS Law).
- d. Fire extinguisher, distress signal and anchor are required on ALL motorized watercraft.

PERSONAL WATER CRAFT (NYS Law):

- a. Operators must wear an approved PFD.
- b. Operator must be attached with a cut-off device.
- c. Can only be operated between sunrise and sundown and the town ordinance speed limit on the lake is less than 6 mph between 8:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. for any motorized vessel.
- d. May not be operated within 500 ft of a designated swimming area.
- e. Reckless operation prohibited (wake jumping, weaving through traffic, or other maneuvers that jeopardize safety).

REGISTRATION: All motorized watercraft must be registered and display the registration numbers (NYS Law).

ENVIRONMENT:

- a. Help keep unwanted aquatic plants and zebra mussels out of the lake. Thoroughly wash your vessel and flush the cooling system at a location away from the shoreline.
- b. Avoid spilling gasoline or oil. Repair leaks immediately.
- c. Dispose of litter properly in bins on shore.
- d. Do not use soaps or cleansers in or near the lake.

Common sense and respect for others are the way to ensure a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone using the lake. CLCS is not

a law-enforcement agency and leaves such duties to the Columbia County Sheriff's Department, The CLCS has posted rules and regulations and distributes these excerpts to encourage lake users to know the rules and observe them.

Concerns about speed, noise, or safe handling of any motorized watercraft on the lake should be directed to: COLUMBIA COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT 518-828-3344.

NYS Rules and Regulations for Non-Motorized Watercraft (Kayaks, Paddleboards, etc.)

ersonal Flotation Devices (PFDs) must also be worn year-round by all children under 12 years of age on any boat less than 65 feet in length, unless within a fully enclosed cabin; by anyone engaging in towed activities, such as water-skiers or wake-boarders; and while on board a personal watercraft. Otherwise, a wearable life jacket must be available for every passenger on board every vessel, including non-motorized watercraft such as canoes and kayaks." New York State Boating Laws and Regulations, 2010, see www.nysparks.com/recreation/boating.

Along with rowboats, kayaks, canoes, and sailboats, paddle boards are considered boats and must have a U.S. Coast Guard approved, properly sized, serviceable, and readily accessible life jacket on board for each person, just like any other boat, mechanized or not. From May 2 through October 31 such persons are not required to wear a life jacket, though it is highly suggested (but they must have one on board and readily accessible).

From November I to May I, everyone on all pleasure vessels which include paddleboards, rowboats, kayaks, canoes, sailboats, and motorboats must be wearing a life jacket while underway, which means as long as the boat is not anchored or tied to a dock. Drifting counts as underway.

Life jackets are the most important piece of equipment on a boat and can save your life; we recommend that they be worn at all times.





2018 Weed Treatment Plan: A Bold Effort=\$\$\$

ur expectations for Copake Lake continue to rise. We want cleaner, clearer water, fewer nuisance weeds, adequate lake level, among other factors, all beginning earlier and ending later in the season. Fortunately, in 2017, the weather and the environment were in our favor. With the exception of late season growth of Eurasian Water Milfoil, it was a pretty good year.

What needs to happen to make 2018 better? First, the weather and Mother Nature must cooperate. Then, treatments to maintain lake quality must be successful. We would like to avoid early-season lake use restrictions and keep nuisance weeds down through September.

The Lake Management Committee (LMC) has recommended a bold treatment strategy for 2018. To make a big effort to kill off the invasive milfoil, it is proposed to treat the whole lake with fluridone (Sonar®) in early Spring 2018. It is expected that this treatment will control the milfoil for 3 seasons. The Sonar® treatment will cost over \$120,000 which is more than 3 times our usual treatment cost. Both the LMC and CLCS Board of Trustees were unanimous in recommending the treatment. The cost is more than the annual CLCS income, so CLCS will be drawing from reserve funds to pay for the treatment. We expect that lake users will rise to the occasion and increase their donations to continue improving lake quality.

A similar whole-lake Sonar® treatment was done in 2002, when milfoil covered 30% of the lake and weed harvesting could not keep up. It wasn't until 2005 that weeds returned and required treatment. We have been spot-treating increasingly larger areas to control weeds ever since. In 2017, about 18% of the lake was treated. The milfoil was knocked-down, but regrew to be a nuisance in mid-August.

What to expect in 2018?

- NYS DEC permit application will be made this fall to meet our early treatment schedule.
- Treatment will be planned for April or May when the weeds are just starting to grow.
- Swimming/fishing are only restricted on the day of treatment.
- Sonar® is a <u>systemic</u> herbicide so it will take several weeks for the weeds to absorb and be affected. Patience will be needed.
- All the weeds in the lake will be affected by the treatment, but the abundant native weeds should recover quickly.
- · Algae control treatments will be done if needed.

COPAKE LAKE SHORELINE VULNERABLE TO INCREASED EROSION

n recent years, areas of Copake Lake have seen rapid erosion of its shoreline. This increased deterioration is not unique to Copake Lake. It's been observed in many mid-western and northeastern states. To see what erosion looks like, all you have to do is paddle close to shore to see its damage.

I. What is shoreline erosion?

It is the gradual or rapid process when soil is undercut and sediment is washed away from the natural shoreline by wave action resulting in loss of land (see Photo I and Photo 2). The sediment may then be redeposited and built up in other areas of the lake.

2. What are the causes of lakeshore erosion?

a. Wave action primarily driven by wind or boats, especially during high water.

- **b.** Ice damage if lake level remains high during the winter.
- **c.** Removal of trees, vegetation and rocks from the natural shoreline to build docks, and platforms to the water, and to create views and sand beaches (see Photo 3).
- **d.** Large fluctuations of water levels or "bounce" which is occurring more frequently due to intense storms with heavy rain fall.
- **e.** Hard surface vertical retaining walls which erode neighboring properties and degrade habitats (see Photo 4).



3. What are the harmful effects of erosion?

- a. Increased cloudiness and turbidity near shore.
- b. Increased sedimentation
 - · Releases nutrients into lake.
 - Alters the bottom contour of lake

COPAKE LAKE SHORELINE VULNERABLE TO INCREASED EROSION (continued)

- Promotes increased algae and weed growth
- c. Diminished habitat for wildlife and fisheries.
- **d.** Increased expense to protect and restore shoreline.

What can be done NOW to slow down the process of erosion?

What steps can property owners and HOAs take to protect their shoreline?

- Check out the website, https://www.dec.ny.gov.permits/67096.html for NYDEC Shoreline Stabilization Techniques. It provides eco-safe ways to protect the shoreline. Avoid constructing vertical retaining walls.
- Promote a natural shoreline: plant trees, shrubs and a buffer zone to protect waterfront property.

What can Power Craft and PWC operators do help protect the lake?

- Boat in the middle of the lake when creating large wakes.
- Always observe no-wake zones when 100 ft. from shore, docks and other boats.

- Be mindful of how your wake affects the shoreline.
- Leave and approach the shoreline perpendicular to the shore, not parallel to it.

In 2017, the Lake Management Committee created a Shoreline Erosion Prevention (SEPC) sub-committee. Its purpose is to better understand and educate the Copake Lake community about the problem of shoreline erosion at Copake Lake. SEPC plans to research how other lakes are dealing with the problem of erosion and methods used to minimize its effects

SEPC plans to develop a survey to assess shoreline erosion. The survey will be distributed to property owners to gather their feedback. We hope it will improve our understanding of erosion around Copake Lake. If you are interested in learning more, and/or want to join our committee, please contact Barbara Bunger, 413-717-0764.







We'll identify them and check out advice from the NYS Department of Health about eating fish you catch from New York State waters.

I encourage you to contact me soon so I can save you a place. You will receive details on where to meet and other information upon registration. - " Minimum age is 6 for child, maximum of 2 children under 16 per adult
- " All gear provided; canoe, paddles, PFD's
- " For safety reasons, we cannot allow other boats to join group
- "Wear old sneakers or water shoes that can get wet/muddy (flip-flops come off!)
- "Prepare to be knee-deep in water
- "Smokers are asked to please refrain from smoking during the trip

"Bring food, water, snacks, hat, sunscreen, insect repellent, a smile, and a sense of adventure!



2017 BIRDS AND BIRDHOUSES NESTING REPORT*

From the golf course at the Copake Country Club
A CLCS Mission: Preserving the ecological balance at Copake Lake

*Note: With the support and cooperation of Jon Urban, Austin Urban, and Mark Anderson of the Copake Country Club/The Greens Restaurant, birdhouses have been placed throughout the golf course to attract birds that are "cavity nesters" (birds that build nests in holes and cavities, instead of on branches or other open areas; birdhouses are designed to offer birds more hole accommodations to choose from). As always, the most common species in our area that use them are Eastern Bluebirds and Tree Swallows, both migrants that come north to areas like ours in spring to breed. (Many of the year-round birds that you know — Cardinals, Blue Jays, most Sparrows, etc. — and some of the migrants, don't nest in cavities, so they don't use birdhouses.)

-Number of birdhouses (of any size) now on the golf course: **39**

-Birdhouses that had nests of any kind in 2017: 33

EASTERN BLUEBIRDS

- -14 nests (11 of them successful)
- -Approximately 60 eggs total
- -42-45 babies (nestlings)
- -"Other" (babies died, eggs failed or disappeared): approx. 15

TREE SWALLOWS

- -24 nests (23 successful)
- -Approx. 75 eggs
- -Approx. 72 nestlings
- -"Other": 8

HOUSE WRENS

- -6 nests (5 successful)
- -15-20 eggs
- -10-13 nestlings
- -"Other": I

LOCAL BIRDS THAT ARE CAVITY NESTERS:

- -Year-round local birds that also nest in cavities (Nuthatches, Titmice, Chickadees) didn't use any of our houses this year.
- -A total of 9 nests built by HOUSE SPARROWS, the enemies of birdhouse-nesting birds, were humanely removed from our houses (by me), using standard ornithology-approved measures.
- -4 birdhouses out there are designed for bigger cavitynesters (several Woodpeckers, Eastern Screech Owl, American Kestrel); unfortunately, we had no tenants use them this year. There are plenty of Woodpeckers on the golf course, a few Screech Owls, an occasional Kestrel, so we leave the "Vacancy" sign lit up for them.

LOCAL BIRDS THAT ARE NOT CAVITY NESTERS:

KILLDEER

- -I confirmed nest (on the ground just west of the 18th fairway)
- -4 eggs
- -Probably a success (Killdeer babies leave the ground nests with their parents less than <u>one day</u> after hatching)

SPECIAL REPORT:

BALD EAGLES AT COPAKE LAKE

-As I reported last year . . . the Bald Eagle nest that's been active for years south of the I4th hole was in action again last spring. This nest, like most Bald E. nests, is near the top of a very tall tree, so seeing what's happening inside is a challenge without a helicopter, a drone or a massive ladder (can't do that even if we wanted to — Bald Eagle nests are strongly protected by law, so we're not allowed closer than a few hundred feet).

From a safe distance on the ground, I saw much nesting activity up there in March and April. By late April, after I stopped seeing Mom or Dad Eagle in the nest, or in the area, we had to hope that their eggs had hatched and nestlings had fledged the nest (Balds have I-3 eggs per brood). Isolated sightings of Balds flying over the golf course area (adults as well as juveniles, which are brown-streaked and don't yet have the famous all-white Eagle head and tail) were reported in summer and fall, and I had several good views of adult Balds in our area. We don't know if they're from the same family that uses "our" nest. But we're hopeful. Either way, they're Eagles and beautiful. (Bald Eagles generally use the same nest year after year, and they start laying eggs as early as February.)

Enjoy the 2018 spring/summer season at Copake Lake!



"Post Spawning Mortality" On Copake Lake



he term that describes dead fish along the shoreline of Copake Lake during the spring is "Post Spawning Mortality". It is common to lakes and is for the most part, unpreventable.

Fish die at this time of year because as they try to spawn in the shallow water that same water experiences extreme shifts in temperature, oxygen, pH, and ammonia between day and night. Because the spawning fish need to stay at their nest, they must endure these shifting conditions. Fish can go into the spawning period stressed from winter conditions so that they are unable to cope with the additional stress of spawning combined with the environmental fluctuations.

It is our understanding that fishery biologists at the state level don't get concerned by up to several hundred dead fish in lakes the size of Copake Lake, especially if the fish are mixed species such as perch, crappie, sunfish, bluegills, pumpkinseeds and even a few bass. These kills are an example of natural selection by which the weaker fish are removed from the population. The time to be concerned is when all the dead fish are the same species and when the numbers are in the thousands.

It is very likely that Copake Lake contains tens of thousands, if not several hundred thousand, fish. Questions can be directed to CLCS's Lake Management Committee.


